Unit Goals

This unit should enable students to:

Q1

- discuss topics of interest/ controversy related to health and lifestyle
- obtain and process information from a range of texts
- provide insights both orally and in writing pertinent to the issues in health and lifestyle
- demonstrate and increase knowledge of how languages grow and borrow from each other (scientific language)

Q2

- discuss topics of interest/ controversy related to the industrialised world
- obtain and process information from a range of texts
- provide insights both orally and in writing on topics pertinent to issues in the industrialised world
- demonstrate and increase knowledge of how languages grow and borrow from each other (scientific language)
- develop independent problem-solving and collaborative learning skills

Content

The theme of "the world around us" will be addressed in this unit through topics such as:

Q1: Health and leisure

- Leisure, lifestyles and role models
- Health issues

Q2: Global issues

- Environment and climate change
- Globalization and human rights.

General Assessment Criteria

Students will be assessed in each of the assessment tasks on the degree to which they demonstrate:

- communicating
- understanding.

ACT BSSS Assessment Procedures

Completion of assessment items: Students are required to substantially complete and submit all assessment items that contribute to the assessment for a unit unless due cause and adequate evidence is provided. Otherwise, any student who fails to submit assessment tasks worth in total 70% or more of the assessment for the unit will be deemed to have voided the unit.

Late submission of work: Late work will be subject to a penalty of 5% per day including weekends, unless prior arrangement is made for an extension, supported by evidence of due cause for the extension.

Moderation, calculation of unit scores and course scores: Moderation is conducted every semester to ensure comparability of grades from different schools. Your unit scores will be calculated from your results in the assessment items for each unit. These will be scaled through small group moderation with the scaling group consisting of a comparable cohort for the course area in the ACT system. BSSS calculates your course score in each T or H course from your best 80% unit scores. A course score indicates how well you performed in your course compared to all other students in the course's scaling group.

Attendance/Participation: It is expected that students will attend and participate in all scheduled classes/contact time/structured learning activities for the units in which they are enrolled, including off-site components in the blended learning program, unless there is due cause and adequate documentary evidence is provided. Any student whose attendance falls below 90% of the scheduled classes/contact time or 90% participation in structured learning activities in a unit, without due cause supported by adequate evidence will be deemed to have voided the unit.
